

Campus Crime & Security Report – Philadelphia Campus

Harrisburg University of Science & Technology strives to offer a safe and secure campus. The Site Coordinator has the primary responsibility for supervising security on campus. Armed police officers from the Philadelphia Police Department (PPD) are authorized to maintain security of the campus during the day and at night. The Philadelphia Police Department can be reached at **9-1-1** for an emergency and **3-1-1** for non-emergencies. If you observe or become aware of a crime, observe a suspicious person, or are a victim yourself, promptly report all emergencies to Philadelphia police. Harrisburg University does not maintain a security staff at the Philadelphia additional location.

Campus security can be enhanced by your help to follow all security policies and using common sense safety practices such as locking your car, walking in groups, reporting suspicious incidents, and protecting your own property by not leaving it unattended. You may report emergencies or other activities by notifying a member of the faculty, staff or administration.

Alcoholic Beverages

Harrisburg University cooperates in the enforcement of State laws regarding the possession, use and sale of alcoholic beverages. Alcohol is not permitted on campus by students or by underage persons or in any public area within the building. A person found in violation of this policy is subject to arrest by local law enforcement and disciplinary action by the University.

Illegal Drugs

Harrisburg University cooperates in the enforcement of all Federal, State and local laws concerning illegal drugs. Anyone in the possession of, using, or selling illegal drugs on campus or in any public area within the building will be subject to arrest and disciplinary action by the University.

Campus Access and Maintenance

Harrisburg University students have access to the campus facility from 8am to 5pm weekdays. Exterior lighting is maintained to keep the campus well lit. Maintenance personnel inspect the campus to discover and correct health, safety and maintenance problems. Security related maintenance problems such as locks, doors and windows in need of repair should be reported.

Sexual Violence

In accordance with the Pennsylvania Act 104, Article XX-G, the "Sexual Violence Education at Institutions of Higher Education Act," enacted November 17, 2010, should you become a victim of sexual violence, you have the following rights:

- *You have the right to notify the following individuals or agencies if you are a victim of sexual violence.*
 1. *University administrator responsible for dealing with sexual violence: Please contact the Site Coordinator, Elizabeth Fever (215) 574-9600 x204*
 2. *Local law enforcement agencies: Philadelphia Police Department: 911*
- *You have the right to request assistance from the university to make these notifications.*
- *You have the right to obtain an order of protection, a no contact order, a restraining order, or similar lawful orders issued by a criminal or civil court, or enforce an order already in existence.*
- *You have the right to request that a prompt disciplinary proceeding be initiated against the accused.*
- *You have the right to be notified of the outcome of any disciplinary actions against the accused.*
- *You have the right to be notified of any options of changing your academic or campus living situation.*
- *You have the right to have others present during disciplinary proceeding or other related meetings.*

Informational Programs for Students

Students entering a University program of study are encouraged to attend new student orientation, which includes a review of policies and rules related to conduct and behavior expected of students. Students receive information on topics such as drug and alcohol abuse, sexual violence awareness, and date rape crimes. If a sexual offense should occur on campus, contact the police and notify the Site Coordinator. Important immediate actions should include preserving any evidence as proof of a criminal offense and obtaining a description of the alleged offender.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Policy and Procedures

In the event of a significant emergency, notification to the campus community will commence via a text and email alert to personal electronic devices upon confirmation of the emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students, faculty or employees. The University will, without delay, and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system unless the notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist victims or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. Any emergency should be reported to the Site Coordinator. Emergency information will be disseminated to the larger community by a website notice. The Director of Institutional Compliance is responsible for the Emergency Policy and Procedure process. The emergency policy and procedures are tested on at least an annual basis.

Timely Warning Information

In the event of a sexual assault or other criminal act on campus, the Site Coordinator should be notified immediately. Harrisburg University pledges to provide timely warning to students, faculty and employees if a felony act should occur on campus. The University will provide instructions to maintain campus security, which may include lockdown or the cancellation of all classes. For victims of an alleged sex offense, the Student Services Office will coordinate academic options with the student.

Campus Disciplinary Action

In cases of an alleged sex offense, both the accuser and the accused will be required to meet with Student Services. Both parties may request other persons to be present during the disciplinary hearing. Student Services will determine whether no action, a suspension, or formal dismissal from the University is warranted. Both parties will be informed of the outcome of any determination.

Policy for Preparing the Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

Each year the Campus Crime and Security Report is prepared during the month of June. Crime statistics for the various required reporting categories for the previous calendar year are requested from the Chief of the Philadelphia Police Department. A comprehensive review of Incident Reports filed by and with the University Security Office is also conducted. The Director of Compliance then compiles the statistics for inclusion in the annual report and distributes the report by email to students, faculty and staff and posts the report on the MyHU website. The report is also made available to prospective students and families by posting the report to the University's primary website www.HarrisburgU.edu. A paper copy of the report is also available upon request and copies are readily available in the University Admission Office.

Confidential Crime Reporting

Victims or witnesses are strongly encouraged to report any crime promptly and directly to the Philadelphia Police Department. However, a victim or witness may report a crime on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. A completed Incident Report, summarizing the nature of the crime and suspect(s) shall be submitted to the Office of Compliance where it will be held in confidence for inclusion in the Annual Report.

Services for Sex Offense Victims

The University does not have on-campus counseling, mental health or student services for a victim of a sex offense. Victims are referred to a nearby hospital for professional treatment and counseling.

Crime Definitions: Burglary and Larceny

The felony crime of burglary is constituted by the act of breaking into and entering a house or any of various buildings, by day or night, with the intent to steal (theft). The felony crime of larceny is the act of wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods from an individual's possession with the intent to convert them to the taker's own use.
